Hello to all. We thought we would share a bit this month about Hong Kong, where we live. Hong Kong is a Special Administrative Region of China. It was until 1997 a British Overseas Possession, when it transferred to the Peoples Republic of China. It has a population of about 7 million. The SAR of Hong Kong is made up of the Kowloon peninsula that extends from the mainland, and very many islands from a few square kilometers to several hundred. Lantau island is the largest, with Hong Kong Island being the second. Deborah and I live in an area of the New Territories called Sheung Shui. On the map be-



low it is in the green area called Lo Wu.

The main language in Hong Kong is Cantonese (A dialect of Mandarin), and a lot of the people speak a little English. Some of the people speak Mandarin, or Putonghua (The Chinese Common Language). It makes it difficult for us as we are learning Mandarin as spoken in China, but when we get back to Hong Kong, we have to switch gears and speak in Cantonese. It can be very confusing. Mandarin and Cantonese are the same in writing, but the folks in Canton province decided thousands of years ago that they were going to say it differently.

The weather here is just plain HOT. We arrived in June, and of course

that is the hottest time of the year. June, July, and August are in the high 90's to low 100's, with a average relative humidity of 85 to 95 percent. To make matters worse the evenings in the summer rarely dip below a steamy 85 degrees. We very much miss the cool nights of Wyoming.

In fact we have started to watch the Teton Pass web cam so we can see snow! We are able to watch what's happening in Jackson from the town square web cam also. You all know by now that every day Deborah and I are involved in carrying Bibles into China. You would think that after doing the same thing every day it might get a little ordinary, or that we might get a little complacent. Well, our Father in Heaven see's to it every day that every book gets through. There is always a distraction or something that gets the customs agents to look away from the screen just as our bag's are going through the scanner. Last week was no exception. One of our group was passing through the customs area about 3:00 in the afternoon, the same time when the school children return from HK to China. The Guards were particularly thorough this week, and we were not getting much through. As the guard motioned for my friend to put his suitcase on the X-Ray scanner, the kid in front of him put his school bag on the scanner, and proceeded to jump on the scanner! Well before you could do anything the kid had squatted down and ridden through the X-Ray machine. All the while the customs agents were part terrified, and part stunned. The child emerged on the other side of the scanner, rather triumphantly, and of course the guards did not even get a chance to look at what was in my partners bag.

On his last day here, he got stopped, and got to witness to the customs official, and after a persistent week of trying, the customs official finally accepted a Bible. His next trip was successful!
